As this activity is carried out with the highest levels of safety and includes an equipment prep before you start climbing, you'll have nothing to worry about as you embark in this unique and exhilarating adventure.

For anyone who wants to get a sense of Sydney's past then a walk through the Rocks will feel like going back in time. As the area where the first European settlers stepped ashore, this historic quarter is seen as the birthplace of modern Sydney. With over 100 beaches located in and around the city, you'd be mad not to visit a few of Sydney's golden beaches. The waters at Manly provide ideal conditions for surfing and the Manly Surf School, voted the No. 1 surf school in New South Wales is the place to be for any aspiring surfer. The school runs daily classes open to all ages and abilities as well as private sessions, so grab a board and get involved in this fun-filled Aussie sport!

In this tranquil oasis amidst towering skyscrapers, you'll find shimmering koi ponds, cascading waterfalls, and a peaceful ambiance. The best part? Entry to this serene haven is completely free.

5. Awesome Reasons To Visit In Sydney

ONE OF THE MOST SCENIC COASTAL WALKS IN THE WORLD

The Bondi to Coogee walk is a 6km path that sits up on the cliffs of Sydney's stunning coast for anyone to enjoy — and both tourists and locals take equal advantage. It was my favorite thing I did over the course of three weeks in the city, and I practically dedicated a whole day to it, stopping often for pictures and breaking for lunch along Bondi Beach before doing the walk back home all over again.

Most people only do it in one direction, but I loved seeing how the scenery changed between mid-day and golden hour. With that said, it can be quite an endeavor to do the whole walk in the heat, so I recommend picking morning or afternoon when the temperature cools off a bit.

A BRUNCH CULTURE TO DIE FOR

Australians do not mess around when it comes to their "brekkie," and typical breakfast food seems to be served all day at many of Sydney's most beloved establishments. The best part is that while the food is so tasty, it's also so much healthier than your standard American diner fare. You won't find a plethora of pancakes, croissants and bacon strips on the menus here.

Rather, expect for every spot to put their own twist on "avo smash" and serve up a healthy dose of açai bowls and eggs with dukkah. My favorite brunch spots while in Sydney were Porch and Parlour, Shuk, and Sadhana Kitchen. The only downside: brunch can easily cost \$40 after you've thrown a fresh pressed juice or flat white into the mix.

THE ICONIC OPERA HOUSE

Witnessing this architectural beauty is reason alone to make a stop in Sydney — and it's easy to get an epic view from a multitude of spots around the harbour. Of course getting up close and personal is a must (as is a cocktail at the famed Opera Bar next door), but I also enjoyed the views of the Opera House from the Royal Botanical Gardens and by ferry. Next time I visit Sydney, I'll definitely be checking out the Opera House performance schedule ahead of time and booking tickets for a show to get the full experience.

A GORGEOUS NEW TAP ROOM JUST CAME INTO TOWN

Most breweries seem to follow a certain theme: masculine, industrial, probably heavy on the metal and wooden accents, rustic. Ya feel me? Well, let the new Endeavor TapRooms totally blow your mind. I happened to stumble upon this gem during a self-led walking tour of the famous Rocks district, and seriously never wanted to leave. Welcome to my brewery of dreams.

Before visiting Sydney, I imagined it as a super modern city. Not to the futuristic scale of places like Dubai and Singapore, but I just didn't imagine that the gorgeous old-world architecture you
